

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
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An Egyptian



Egypt has long been a country known for its mathematicians and scientists. Since ancient times, many of the worlds leading s cientists have come from Egypt, and m odern times are no exception. One of the most influential modern scientists to hail from Egypt is renowned former NASA scientist Dr. Farouk El-Baz.

Dr. Farouk El-Baz was born on January 2nd, 1938 in Zagazig, a town on the Nile Delta. He studied at Ain Shams University, and at age 20 received a B.Sc. in Chemistry and G eology. Soon after, Dr. El-Baz traveled to the United States, and received a MS degree in Geology from what is now Missouri University of Science and Technology in 1961. In 1964 he received his PhD in Geology f rom the Missouri University of Science. and throughout the years Dr. El-Baz has received many other honorary degrees from u niversities across the United States and

University for two years between 1958 1960, and the University of Heidelberg, Germany from 1964 1965.

Dr. El-Baz also participated in the first offs hore oilfield in the Gulf of Suez, the El-Morgan, while working with the Pan American U.A.R. Oil Company in 1966.

B eginning in 1967, Dr. El-Bazs extensive knowledge and expertise was utilized when h e joined NASA as Supervisor of Lunar Science Planning on the Apollo Program. Over the next 6 years, Dr. El-Baz was given the responsibility of selecting sites for the A pollo missions. Among a few different titles he held, Dr. El-Baz also held the title of Chairman of the Astronaut Training Group. Dr. El-Baz did such a fantastic and detailed i ob in preparing the astronauts of Apollo 15 for their mission that Command Module Pilot Alfred Worden said, After the King's [Farouk's nickname] training, I feel like I've been here before. Dr. El-Baz was so talented in translating complex scientific terms into laymans terms that he was also regularly in charge of briefing the press on the results of the missions, often being quoted.

After the completion of his tasks with NASA, Dr. El-Baz joined the esteemed Smithsonian Institution, and was also elected as a member of the Lunar Nomenclature Task Group of the International Astronomical Union, which he is still a part of, and where he names characteristics of the moon as exhibited in photographs taken on Lunar missions.

Having been such an asset in his previous w ork with them, NASA appointed Dr. El-Baz to the post of Principal Investigator of the Earth Observations and Photography Experiment on the Apollo-Soyuz Test Project (ASTP), which was the first combined space mission between America and the USSR in July 1975. On this mission a strong priority was placed on capturing images of dry and arid environments such as the Sahara D esert, as well as other features of the Dr. El-Baz even taught Geology at Assiut planet. Some of these images are displayed





in the halls of Boston University, where Dr. El-Baz now teaches.

Dr. El-Baz spent several years traveling to different ends of the globe to collect data, e ven chronicling one of his journeys for N ational Geographic and the Explorers Journal. Having spent so much time and effort researching the origins of deserts. Dr. El-Baz was elected as Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS). Next, Dr. El-Baz joined Itek Optical Systems as President, where he oversaw the u sage of the Space Shuttles Large Format Camera photos.

As a service to his native Egypt, Dr. El-Baz also served as Science Advisor to the late President Anwar El Sadat, from 1978 1981, w here he was responsible for selecting areas of desert land that could be developed w ithout harming the environment, to accommodate Egypts growing population. In 1986, Dr. El-Baz joined Boston University as a Research Professor and the Director of the Center for Remote Sensing. He continues to conduct research using satellite images to Iearn about the worlds deserts. He is even responsible for changing common belief that deserts are man-made by giving evidence and spreading the concept that they are. in fact, the result of major changes in the worlds climates. Dr. El-Baz is also accredited with locating groundwater in the dry and a rid locations of Oman, the United Arab E mirates, and his native Egypt. He found the groundwater by analyzing radar images of depressions in the terrain, believing that these depressions must be ground water





Have you ever read a book and said, "The whole world must read this book? How come it's hidden from people?" These are the exact words I said when I first read "The Pachomian Koinonia, the Life of St. Pachomius." This book is very unique in how it shows you the life of the early Christians in Egypt during the fourth century, with detail you won't find in any other book. You find out how they eat, how they meet, andhow they pray. It's full of very interesting stories that are full of wisdom.

T his book is about the life of St. Pachomius, who started the Koinonian life. Koinonia is a Greek word that means f ellowship; or more accurately the life of fellowship. This life of fellowship w as first introduced in the book of A cts when Christians lived a life of s haring everything in life and no one o wned anything alone. St. Pachomius r eintroduced this early Christian life in a systematic way in monasticism. M onastic life had started with St. Anthony where he taught people how to be monks, either individually or in small groups in different cells. St. Pachomius i ntroduced the life Koinonia after he received its details from an angel of the Lord. St. Pachomius is the one who started the monastic life in a monastery; once again by a divine guidance. He started establishing houses first, where people lived together in life of fellowship. Each house had people who were of the same spiritual level -- some houses for beginners, some for spiritually advanced believers, and some for ascetic monks. S t. Pachomius trained his spiritual children to move forward in their spiritual life. He had thousands and thousands of trainees. His legacy continued after his life on earth and spread monasticism all over the world. St. Benedict, for example, u sed St. Pachomius' ruleand spread them even further.

The life story of St. Pachomius is b eautiful, and it is worth reading. He didn't start his life as a typical saint, who to grow in it in a smooth way.
